














We are thanking God for all of you – your prayers and partnership continue to provide the fuel and the focus as we pursue our mission:

A FRAMEWORK FOR FLOURISHING

If you contemplate the phrase "Framework for Flourishing," can you see the frame of a house or a church - plain, old, bare bones that also end up providing structure for a cozy home, or

steel beams that end up supporting stained glass and flying buttresses? Or do you see a plain, sturdy wooden trellis that ends up allowing a flowering vine to just grow and bloom and travel as it wishes?

Regardless of where your imagination takes you when you hear the phrase "Framework for Flourishing," I hope you see the value of both of those realities at the same time – building a framework that is both concrete and yet allows for significant creativity.

When it comes to human flourishing at the community level, we at the Nehemiah Foundation believe that all of us can engage in meaningful and intentional work that is pragmatic and organized while also led by the fresh and innovative wind of the Spirit.

AGENTS OF FLOURISHING

Dr. Amy Sherman is actually a friend of this ministry – she visited Springfield and interviewed our Nehemiah Foundation founder, Wally Martinson, in the early 2000s. I had the honor of speaking to her on a Zoom call and catching her up on our work. I learned more about her current work at the Sagamore Institute, and she shared her inspiration for her most recent book, "Agents of Flourishing: Pursuing Shalom from Every Corner of Society." https://sagamoreinstitute.org/

In addition to her substantial work at the Sagamore Institute in Indianapolis, Dr. Sherman was inspired by the work of the Thriving Cities Group based in Charlottesville, Virginia. The Thriving Cities Group has developed a helpful framework, or ecosystem, for what they call "transforming cities through civic design." https://thrivingcitiesgroup.com

Dr. Sherman's book, though inspired by those Thriving Cities Group ideas, boldly takes the framework into the theological and ministry space in both profound and practical ways. In "Agents of Flourishing: Pursuing Shalom in Every Corner of Society," she not only explains and unpacks this excellent framework for local pastors, ministry leaders and community members, but also shares her insight on how kingdom-minded people can build effective strategies for advancing the kingdom in ways that bless everyone, especially the most vulnerable in our midst.

She describes human flourishing in six realms, or endowments, and invites us all into pursuing and cultivating shalom in each of these areas of community life – bringing heaven to earth in complex and holistic ways.

After spending some time in Dr. Sherman's book, I am more convinced than ever that this level of shalom-work comes with its own home-work. 

INVESTING IN HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS


In "Agents of Flourishing: Pursuing Shalom in Every Corner of Society," Amy Sherman identifies six arenas of civilized life that God has endowed to help communities experience thriving. God's first institution was marriage, and upon this basic unit of civilization rests the capacity and responsibility to "be fruitful and multiply" - not just biologically, but in every sense of the word "shalom" (peace). Sherman identifies this arena as The Good (the realm of social mores and ethics) and suggests strategies to strengthen marriages.

We'll reflect on three investments: in our own marriage, in this community and in the transfer of faith to the next generation.

IN OUR OWN MARRIAGE

You can't export what you don't have yourself

In March 1990, having been married about 11 years, we (Lavern & Ronda) were invited to attend a marriage weekend workshop - all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday until noon. "We don't have time, and our marriage is OK, but thanks," we politely replied to the couple inviting us. You'd think those are strong enough reasons to break down any persistence. They weren't.



Our marriage journey became characterized by what happens to so many couples. We were co-existing as parents of three children, working full-time and just trying to get by. No divorce language or nasty fights, but also none of the romance and affection from 10 years earlier.

"All right, we'll go," we finally said to the couple who kept pestering us to attend the marriage workshop. Inwardly, we were thinking, "We'll go and pick up a few tools for those struggling couples we're working with at the church." A real gesture of humility and teachability for a seven-year pastor of a community church in Cincinnati!

Our experience and takeaways from this weekend adventure in March 1990 changed the trajectory of our own relationship. We became a team with productive communication and conflict resolution tools. On a blue and red plaid couch, we prayerfully vowed to invest in marriages for the rest of our lives. That date was March 11, 1990. Some 33 years later, we are grateful for that persistent couple who started the ripple effects by a simple invitation to enrich our own marriage.

IN CLARK COUNTY MARRIAGES

Going "upstream" to affect change

In 2003-2004 Bob Suver, Wally Martinson and John Landess landed on an idea to invest in Clark County marriages and families. As the then-Director of Clark County Job and Family Services, Suver had been looking for a way to "go upstream" and strengthen marriages in order to reduce the number of fragile and unstable households his agency was serving. At that time in Clark County, there were as many marriage failures every year as weddings, one of the highest failure rates in the country.

Wally Martinson, then-director of the Nehemiah Foundation, had solid connections in the faith community. John Landess, director of the Turner Foundation, saw value in pursuing community transformation by investing in marriages. The product of this collaboration was the launch of a nonprofit agency named Marriage Savers of Clark County.

In 2004, 48 pastors and leaders signed a community agreement to raise the standard of marriage through premarital preparation, enrichment events and marriage mentoring. In time, over 300 clergy and community leaders in Clark, Greene and Champaign

Counties joined the agreement. The agency was renamed to Marriage Resource Center of Miami Valley to reflect a broader service area and to avoid being seen only as a "911 for marriages."

By 2018, the marriage failure rate in Clark County decreased to 44.7% compared to 2003, about twice the 21.6% decrease of the Ohio rate and the 27.6% U.S. decrease. Also, the marriage rate was up 8.3% compared to declines of 16.4% for Ohio and 17.7% across the country.

Suver, who observed the community marriage investment model in Chattanooga, Tennessee at First Things First, has expressed pride and fulfillment in bringing it to Clark County, Ohio. Millions of dollars in taxpayer savings (at \$30,000 per divorce averted) and thousands of healthier relationships are a satisfying legacy to leave.

IN ETERNAL SIGNIFICANCE

The connection between faith and family

Would you agree that family is the primary means of transmitting faith to the next generation? It certainly seems clear from a familiar scripture in the Jewish Torah known as the Shema in Deuteronomy 6:4-9.



"Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates."

In their book "Endgame: The Church's Strategic Move to Save Faith and Family in America," John Van Epp and J. P. De Gance cite declining religious affiliation as of 2015 by contrasting three generations:

BOOMERS 1946-64 - 87% affiliation

GEN XERS 1965-80 - 80% affiliation

MILLENNIALS 1981-96 - 65% affiliation

Also, in looking more closely at the percentage of millennials that attend church as of 2015, they discovered the following:

Not continually married parents - 18% attend church

All millennials - 28% attend church

Continually married parents - 35% attend church

"Millennials from continually married parents are 78% more likely to attend church.


This should encourage those who are strengthening marriages and families. Doing so appears to have an eternal significance.

UNLIKELY PARTNERSHIPS OFFER UNPRECEDENTED BLESSINGS

"If you want to build relationships with people across the socio-economic spectrum in your zip code, start with the local public school," said Chuck Bomar, Serving Local Schools.

It's been a common belief that schools could not, and even would not, work with local churches for the sake of their community. In Clark County, we are proud to say this is not the case at all. Since bringing CarePortal to Clark County in 2022, we have seen a beautiful partnership form between Springfield City School District (SCSD) and the faith community. This unlikely collaboration has not only helped to bless many families in our community, but it serves as a testimony that churches and local schools can work well together.

Many of our local churches have the resources - the heart, the manpower and the passion - to bless the most vulnerable in our community. What they often lack are the inroads in making connections with them. That's where CarePortal comes in!

Because every request is vetted properly, churches have the confidence that every request entered into the system is a real-time, heart-felt need and an invitation to be the hands and feet of Jesus to someone in crisis.

Our community has been transformed by this unique and powerful collaboration. In the past year and a half, 13 local churches have partnered with SCSD and other requesting agencies to serve over 700 Clark

County children at an economic impact of over \$107,000!

We recognize this is just the tip of the iceberg.

The needs in our community are immense, and if we are ever going to make a difference, it will require more unique collaborations: local schools and churches and churches working alongside other churches. Simply said, we need more CarePortal churches interested in supporting families in crisis. More churches means more children being served. Additionally, our faith communities share many of our mission-driven characteristics, such as serving the underserved and ensuring that everyone feels welcome and can strive to be their best - and feels supported doing so."

"The partnership between CarePortal and the Springfield City School District has been nothing short of amazing. As one of the larger urban school districts in Ohio, the district is considered 100% economically disadvantaged, providing no-cost breakfast and lunch to ALL students. Approximately 70% of our students are Medicaid eligible and our homeless student population exceeds 300 students, demonstrating the adverse socio-economic conditions that our families face each day. The district is rich in resources, but we would not be able to meet the needs of our families without this partnership. Specifically, and over the course of the school year, 395 children were served through 39 different requests for support, with an economic impact of over \$35,000. However, statistics do not tell the whole story, as the relationships that are built between our community members and the families served develops an ongoing support system for our most needy population."



INVESTING IN BEAUTY AND DESIGN

"Beauty and happiness go together." – Dr. Amy Sherman, "Agents of Flourishing: Flourishing in the Realm of Creativity, Aesthetics, and Design"

"Beauty has a way of sneaking past defenses and speaking in unique ways. To a generation suspicious of truth claims and unconvinced by moral assertions, beauty has a surprising allure. And everything about Jesus Christ is beautiful!" – Brian Zahnd, "Beauty Will Save the World"

More than the obvious realms of human flourishing, such as economics and justice, the realm of "The Beautiful" sometimes requires a smidgen of defense.

BEAUTY HAS A WAY
OF SNEAKING PAST
DEFENSES AND SPEAKING
IN UNIQUE WAYS.

In her book, "Agents of Flourishing: Pursuing Shalom in Every Corner of Society," Dr. Amy Sherman reminds us that:

The places people inhabit matter and have a significant influence on human flourishing. Investing in the beauty and design of the natural environment and the built environment in Clark County will have a "well-being" impact on our community. Any investment in those arenas is good for Springfield and good for the kingdom of God! (Sherman, p. 104).

The arts create avenues for strengthening social relationships – cultivating empathy, understanding and tearing down walls of division. I would imagine and hope that the people of God can see the biblical kingdom benefits speedier than anyone else. (Sherman, p. 105)

Art and beauty teach us, showing us something we could learn no other way. The intuitive and creative process is even fundamental to understanding the realms of math and science, argues artist Makoto Fujimuro. (Sherman, p. 105-106)

Art is healing. Artists speak of the cathartic and therapeutic effects embedded in their own personal creative process, and those of us who experience art can also benefit from the positive effect on our souls. "It's no wonder the discipline of art therapy has arisen in the mental health field." (Sherman, p.106).

Over the next few years, we at the Nehemiah Foundation plan to deepen our exploration of the theological work found in this endowment – The Beautiful. With newer Ministry Partners serving in this realm, such as Agape Dance Company and The UNIFIED Worship Collective, we see a direct opportunity to invest in the arts and cultivate human flourishing in the realm of the arts! Furthermore, many of our Ministry Partners have programming elements that utilize and maximize the benefits of the arts in the lives of those they serve.





CASSANDRA CLARK, AGAPE DANCE COMPANY

I started Agape Dance Company because I've always had a passion for dance and theater arts since I was a child. I was surrounded by it growing up in Pittsburgh. Little did I know that once I gave my life to Christ at 23, that God was going to show me that my passion in dance was for His purpose. I wanted to provide a platform for dancers that fosters the gift of dance to

be a vehicle that spreads the word of God, instills love in our community, and enriches the Kingdom of God. I want to help change the narrative of dancing for the world to dancing for the Word. I believe there is an alliance of worship and communion between the gift of dance and the kingdom of God, and I want all to experience the power of it. Some exciting things that are on our horizon are our upcoming showcase, dance workshops and expanding our curriculum into the City of Springfield.

We live in a world that was designed by the most artistic power there is - God. God's creation isn't something that was done carelessly; it was done on purpose, FOR a purpose. The power of our creativity in the arts holds weight and capability for influential change in our world. There's healing and love in the arts, and it's a proven fact that the arts can spring commonality amongst differences - culture, race and diversity. There's a unifying purpose behind this creative power, and it's our job to be wise stewards over it in our community.

A WORD FROM OUR DANCERS:

ASHA VANCE has been dancing with Agape since 2019 when God first birthed this vision. She has been by Cassandra's side since day one from when they started rehearsing in the basements and sanctuaries of churches. Though she is away at school, she still continues to dance for Agape Dance Company in showcases and other events.

Asha Vance: "Two of the most influential things in this life to me are music and dance. Having the ability



to share the gospel through those two gifts is such a blessing! Springfield is a community that needs so much more than just different activities and paved streets. It needs love and people who strive to live by The Word."

"Fine Arts ministries like this allow individuals to see our Father work and move in a different setting. It is so important to fellowship in a sanctuary, but it is also important for individuals who may not know Christ to understand that God's presence does not just exist in a church."

"Being surrounded by so many beautiful and seasoned women of God makes me feel so full. Hearing their different testimonies and pieces of advice only make me want to strive to grow and be a better young woman."

DESTINI ROBINSON has been with the organization since 2020 and is still dancing for Agape Dance Company. She is dedicated and faithful to what God is doing through her. Her willingness to always step in and volunteer to help is extremely valued and appreciated.

"Music, dance and art allows people to express themselves in a positive way. It's a way to make others happy who are involved. It gives our city a sense of community. I love that I'm able to showcase my ability to dance with God's people. My prayer every time is that I bring someone a little closer to Jesus and that they don't see me, but only Him."

"Dancing in Agape allows me to be in an intimate space with God. When I dance, it's just me and Him. Agape shows others that dance is just another way to praise God. When I dance, I'm reminded why I started at 11 years old. So many people are used to just seeing dance in the church. There isn't anything wrong with that, but this ministry is more than being within the four walls of a building. I love that we can reach others inside and outside the church."

"Belonging to a group like Agape is like being a part of a family. This group has pushed me to do things through dance I never thought I could do! Agape reminds me who I'm dancing for and why I love it so much. I love being on a team with dancers that are so different, but gifted all at the same time. Everyone brings something different to the table that we can all use as we grow closer to God. We're growing as individuals, but most of all, we're growing as a unified team."

RECONCILIATION IS THE GOSPEL

Through the years, I have found myself in countless conversations with Christ followers who view racial unity and reconciliation as a secondary spiritual issue. Statements like, "Just preach the Gospel," are often thrown out as a trump card whose aim is to avoid uncomfortable discussions about racial division in the church. This is very frustrating, but here is the irony... they are right! Let me explain.

Historically in America, we as Christ followers have reduced the Gospel to mean a personal call to salvation that guarantees we have a spot in heaven. This has often led to a spiritually-lazy lifestyle that emphasizes this earth is passing and we are just passively waiting it out. This has led to lax views on creation care, justice and community engagement.

The good news is that the Gospel is far bigger than just our personal salvation plan. It is a cosmic story of God reconciling people to Himself, reconciling people to one another and ultimately restoring all of creation to its former glory (a new "Eden"). This is the Gospel!

So, yes, we need to, "Just preach the Gospel," but not a small, truncated Gospel that relegates us to spiritual hermit crabs waiting on the day of judgment. Rather, preach the Gospel that has the power to both save our eternal souls and transform our earthly dwellings. The Gospel transforms us, and we, in turn, join with God as He transforms the world.

Racial unity is a part of this cosmic Gospel plan of reconciliation. At Simunye, we believe that we are living out the Gospel by creating safe spaces that encourage deep relationships marked by repentance, forgiveness, honesty and vulnerability. And these relationships lead to continued efforts toward racial healing, racial justice and, ultimately, the peace and shalom of our city. Please join us as we "preach the Gospel" and live it out in our city.

"Everyone likes ice cream," said Hunter. "The kids get to eat their own creations and see the public enjoy something they made; it is a great experience for them to serve the community that cares about them."

Hunter dreams about mending "broken and hurt kids" and giving them the opportunity to heal, and wants to give back to the community.

"I would personally love to hire as many of them as I can to work in the detention center and be able to relate and pass on their wisdom to detained youth in similar situations," he said. "Fix, heal, give back, repeat!" Hunter said that adults being engaged with the kids is important in their rehabilitation. "When adults give time, share and relate, you can actually see growth and love, which ultimately leads to salvation."

Helping Citizens Return to Society



In order to have a thriving community, everyone needs the opportunity to thrive. It is our mission at the Clark County Re-Entry Department to support the flourishing of returned citizens (i.e. people coming out of jail or prison, as well as those with prior criminal records). To help our clients thrive, we partner with community groups to provide resources, services and connections to expand their opportunities for success.

Over the past year, we have held several events to support returned citizens, such as record-sealing clinics, Fair Chance Wednesdays (a resource fair) and a wallet drive. The Re-Entry Department also offers one-on-one case management, assisting individuals with finding employment, mental health and housing resources, accessing official documents (such as IDs and birth certificates) and educational training programs. We know that successful reintegration is dependent on a supportive and active community. We are thankful for the community members and organizations across Clark County that help us help others. Your involvement and support creates more opportunities for us to expand our reach and strengthen our flourishing community as a whole.



PRACTICING PROSPERITY IN OUR COMMUNITY

One of the tenets of Think Tank is the idea that what we believe about poverty - and those affected by it - greatly shapes our response. For this reason, we offer a poverty simulation and invite participants to connect to the human impact of poverty, rather than viewing it only through a material lens. This is not an invitation to discount material realities, but to show the connection between economic well-being and human well-being.

To not care about the economic well-being of our neighbor is to not fully care about our neighbor. As Christ followers situated in a community, we must

ask ourselves two simple and vital questions: 1) What is God's desire for all of us? and 2) How should we envision flourishing among us?

Amy Sherman, in her book "Agents of Flourishing" writes, "God does not insist that everyone's economic status be the same. Some people will have more and some less. But his normative intention is for a world without material poverty, period." Throughout history, the church has been the forerunner of tackling poverty, and when we've done it well, we've approached poverty in holistic ways with our neighbors who've faced its damaging effects. God has instructed us

individually and corporately to pursue the wellbeing of our neighbors, from all parts of our community, whether that is through business development, just employment, affordable rental property, homeownership or material relief. As we do, let our guiding image be one of a potluck, where everyone has a place and brings something to the table, rather than a traditional soup kitchen, where only the haves provide food and the have-nots are kept at arm's length (Practicing the Kings Economy).

FAITH COMMUNITY HEALTH MINISTRIES ORGANIZES, GETS NEW LOOK

Faith Community Health Ministries was born in 2020 through a collaboration between Mercy Health and Clark County Combined Health District in Springfield and made possible through grant funds received from the Bon Secours Mercy Health Foundation. The program began as a pilot with five churches closest in proximity to the "Engaged Neighborhood," which was identified by a community housing study as an area of focus (Pleasant to Perrin, S. Limestone Street to Yellow Springs Street).





After the success of the pilot year and first five churches, the program received a continuance grant, again through the BSMH Foundation, and has grown to a total of 11 churches, focusing on churches with both interest and investment in areas of need in the community. In conjunction with the growth of the participating churches, a Springfield faith-based health ministry collaborative was established for crosscongregational connection. The program also grew in partnership, adding The Nehemiah Foundation as a supporting programmatic partner through Pursuing Wholeness: Mental Health & the Church, as well as the receipt of a faith-based partnership Ohio Department of Health grant. Fifteen churches are currently in the program.

Program coordinator, Tina Le Faive, has worked collaboratively with churches, their parishioners


and church leadership to identify appropriate candidates from the congregations who could be a Faith Community Nurse or Health Minister. These identified parishioners receive additional training through the grant to provide additional health care support, navigation and capacity directly within the faith community. Tina has also assisted in supporting congregational assessments, as well as facilitating introductions to local nonprofits, health and safety agencies, advocates (like the Springfield Fire Rescue Division) and more.

"The Faith Community Health Ministries Program walks alongside our churches to equip them with training, resources and tools to care for the needs of their church and community," said Le Faive. "The essential piece of this program is to develop trusting relationships. We have churches supporting one another, learning from each other and walking together to reach those in need. The resources in the Springfield community have been gracious to come to our church services, meetings and events to share their knowledge and program opportunities. We are breaking down denominational barriers, racial barriers and socioeconomic barriers."

Carolyn Young, community health director for Mercy Health, Springfield has been coordinating Mercy's involvement in the program.

"The FCN & HM Program has - and continues to be - a much needed source of good health and resource information for our community and it is sparking impactful change through the equipment of the church body!" said Young. "For Mercy to have the opportunity to collaboratively equip the members of our community and empower them to share resources and information in an authentic relational way is relieving the logistical, mental and physical health strain for many, especially those who experience higher social determinants of health. The program answers the call of many barriers individuals and families in our community experience. In this way, it is like the body of Christ, with each member having value, purpose and intention in the way we are all connected to one another."





Work Hard, Pray Hard! Youth Mission Trip

Two hundred and fifty youth from all over the country embarked upon our community for the Springfield Mission Trip in June. The youth missionaries conducted home repair projects, such as interior and exterior painting, porch/steps building and repair, and wheelchair ramp construction, for 30 elderly, disabled, low-income and veteran residents. This was made possible by VFW post 1031, Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church and the Crabill Family Foundation.




